From Rabbi Rossoff....

I am writing this in the middle of February, and oh, what a week it has been! It began watching the sun set over the Pacific from Coronado Island, California, and is ending as I shovel out my sidewalks and driveway (again) after winter storm Pax's second snowfall. To paraphrase Paul Simon, California seems like a dream to me now.

I lived in southern California for three out of my six years at HUC-JIR, and truth be told, when I left, I had no desire to return to live there. What I missed the most was the changing of the seasons. They have summer when it gets hot and the rest of the year when it is cool. The only snow I ever saw in LA was the artificial white stuff they put under the Santa Claus display, which I felt was not a little disingenuous. I missed the colors of Fall, the first snow of Winter, and, most dear to me, the life-renewing rebirth of Spring which liberates the soul from the confines of the winter. Such is the nature of nature and the changing of the seasons. The seasons' cycles bring warmth and cold, beauty and challenge, and the promise that after the frigid white winter, the warm green spring will surely return.

Like nature around us, our lives as individuals and as families have their cycles and seasons. We go through different stages as individuals, as couples, and as families. Unlike the seasons of nature which are circular and repetitive, the seasons of life and the family life cycle are linear and non-iterative. Clinical research* has found that spirituality and religion promote emotional well-being both in individuals and families. Active involvement in a *kehilah kedosha* (sacred community) like ours has been found to unify families, promote long-term satisfying marriages, lower levels of anxiety and depression, and add to individual and family resilience. Living a serious Jewish life helps us to face, cope with and transcend illness, adversity, tragedy, and loss. It nurtures, faith and hope, provides networks of fellowship and support and connects with a higher Power. Studies have linked family spiritual and religious life – including involvement in family worship and rituals - to better marital adjustment and satisfaction for couples and pro-social, non-materialistic and altruistic values and behaviors in children and adolescents. (Of course, there are always exceptions.)

As we go through the seasons of our lives, we are so very blessed to be part of Temple B'nai Or. Our membership and engagement in Temple not only enriches the community as a whole, it adds to our happiness and emotional wellbeing and that of our children as well. For when the snows fall and life's cold winds blow, we are here with each other and for each other with the warmth of our sacred community and the promise of life renewed.

In our prayers we chant psalms commanding the people of Israel to remember our *brit olam* - our covenant. The Hebrew word olam describes a multi-dimensional infinite concept of both time and space. It means both the whole universe and forever as the ancient Hebrew civilization perceived it. We are bound by this covenant

forever. The Jewish principles provide guidelines to a moral existence. But how do we adopt the wisdom given to us by our ancestors and make it accessible and meaningful to us in the 21st century?

In the URJ biennial of December 2013, I studied with Jewish professionals who all dealt with that question. We heard over and over again by Rabbi Rick Jacobs that our synagogues should open our doors wide and offer our communities acceptance and inclusion with audacious hospitality. Rabbi Jacobs also stated we should meet people where they feel they are. We should not just feel comfortable where we are, even with our successes. We should be ready to evolve, find out what the next paradigm is before the current program becomes stale.



Along with these ideas, many of the American synagogues are moving towards models of strong congregant ownership and leadership. This ownership creates a community that is *arevim ze lazo – responsible for one another*. I have been privileged to serve a community that has members within it that feel so connected that they express their connection and spirituality through their contribution of their most valuable asset, their time. These superb people serve their community by working alongside me within the musical programming. Some sing with me, some organize files, some head and run committees and others volunteer occasional hard work. No matter what the help or service is, it is always greatly appreciated, and a moral teacher to all who are surrounded by it. I am grateful to all those I am surrounded by who elevate us to holiness with their volunteerism.

I hope that in the coming days more of us will connect to a spiritual existence through feelings of ownership to our community.




RELIGIOUS SCHOOL Stronger with our volunteers
