Traditionally every morning after getting out of bed and thanking God for our life, there is a passage in the siddur (our prayerbook) taken from the Talmud, so to start the day with study:

These are the things of which a person enjoys the fruit in this world while the principal remains in the World to Come—they are:

Honoring one's father and mother,

Engaging in deeds of compassion,

Arriving early for study, morning and evening,

Dealing graciously with guests,

Visiting the sick,

Providing for the wedding couple,

Accompanying the dead for burial, being devoted in prayer,

And making peace among people.

But, the study of Torah encompasses them all.

At Temple B'nai Or, we have our B'nai Mitzvah chant these words as they lead the Shabbat morning services because these words are a good summary of how we strive to live as individual Jews and how TBO strives to serve its members as a community. I could write an essay about any one of these acts, but I want to look at the opening lines and the financial language they use. The ancient Rabbis are saying that by doing these mitzvot, these acts of love, we get rewards now, we get the interest from the endowment that we are building for the next world. Yes, implied here is a statement about the afterlife (also another essay), but I want to look at it this way: Living a life of goodness pays off right now, but it is also an investment for the future.

By being a member of Temple B'nai Or you are investing in our future—the future of our specific Jewish community in Morris County and in the future of the Jewish people. You of course invest in us with your money through annual giving and other donations. One obvious example is our "Imagine the Possibilities" campaign that just paid off our mortgage. And, by being a member who lives a Jewish life in community with others, you are investing in the future because the acts of Jewish living grow by inspiring others to live this way and by raising new generations of Jews.

Temple B'nai Or is a place of learning for all generations, it is a place of caring for all generations, and it is a place where our corner of the Jewish world will continue because we have all made the investment.


I am especially proud of several key achievements, including:

I have thought quite a lot about how we can "Imagine the Possibilities" for our Kehillah. I am deeply proud of how we have addressed the physical needs of our Temple (security, infrastructure), the financial needs (mortgage campaign, securing grants), and our education needs (new programs in our Pre-School, fabulous events for the Religious School children). However, the thing I am most proud of was our ability to increase engagement opportunities for our Temple family members.

We hired a Manager of Membership Engagement (Samantha Berman) who has begun thinking about ways that we can find meaningful interaction opportunities for all the members of our diverse community. Among the early "wins" in this area was the re-vitalization of our Renaissance group with fabulous programs on current events and areas of Jewish cultural interest. We also created a diverse set of Adult Education programs led by Rabbi Satz, congregants with expertise in Jewish issues, and outside speakers discussing the current state of Israel, antisemitism risks, and other critical issues facing our community. In addition, we created many great social events (including my favorite Coffee House!) and the TBO Expo, which allowed members of TBO and members of the greater Morristown community to better understand all the opportunities that our synagogue offers. Lastly, we conducted a comprehensive survey of our members so that we can better understand the needs and wants of our community. We have used the findings to craft our programming to be more relevant and meaningful.

While I am proud of all these accomplishments, I am also proud of all the great volunteers who led these efforts. Our Temple community is strong, but this is only because so many dedicated and talented individuals have given of themselves to make it work. I will not single out any individual as there are too many to name; however, if you participated in creating any of our programming this year, I deeply thank you! Equally important, if you chose to spend your valuable time participating in programs, events, or services at TBO this year, I am also thankful. It is important to remember that by participating, you allow others to participate. It is my commitment to find ways to create as many meaningful experiences as possible for our Kehillah, and I hope that each member finds some things that add value to their unique Jewish journey.

Thank you, Barbara, for introducing me to Shirley and Eva, who welcomed me to sit with them at my first Shabbat in decades. I felt instantly like I had found my home to explore and grow my Jewish faith. This was MY synagogue, and I was impassioned to give back and help. Whether it was for five minutes at a time, or as part of a committee that interested me, volunteering became a significant and fulfilling connection to TBO.

Feeling connected to our community through volunteering and engagement brought many gifts I did not expect or realize that I had waited a very long time to experience. One example: My dad passed 20 years ago, and this last February, for the first time in those 20 years, I got to stand here for the Yizkor for my dad. First time.

The opportunity to volunteer is a big reason why I am grateful to be connected to all of you here. I will certainly miss everyone when we move out of state at the end of June. Being a part of committees comprised of so many passionate people to learn from and grow with is one reason why I will always remember Temple B'nai Or as a place that I can call my first Jewish home-away-from-home.

PRESCHOOL DIRECTOR



To me, investing in our future means investing in our children. Each day, I have the honor of providing the foundation of education for our youngest learners at Temple B'nai Or Preschool. Many of our students are stepping into a school environment for the very first time. My team and I work diligently to ensure they feel nurtured, loved, and safe from the moment they arrive. We also support parents in building meaningful connections with one another—connections that often blossom into lasting community ties.

Our preschool is a vibrant and active place, open most days and hours of the week. We take great pride in knowing that our students are growing and thriving.

When I began my journey as Preschool Director in 2022, I was asked to help grow our Brody Program. At the time, we had just two classrooms and 13 students. I envisioned a toddler program for children as young as 18 months, and I'm deeply grateful to the Board for supporting that vision.

This school year, we received a new state license allowing us to welcome toddlers. Thanks to this milestone, we brought in 15 new students and their families. We spent the summer constructing a safe and compliant evacuation route, a project overseen with great care by Greg Pine, our VP of Education. Looking ahead, we're excited to welcome another 12 toddlers and families in the 2025–2026 school year.

With our continued growth, we now have five public classrooms, and 45 students enrolled. As a result, we added 12 new educators to our team—each bringing valuable experience, passion, and energy to our community, evident every day.

Another highlight of the year was our continued partnership with Esther and the Torah Explorers program for young families. Together, we made history by hosting the first-ever joint Purim Carnival with our Religious School and Preschool, a celebration of community and Jewish tradition drawing 400+ guests.

As my guru, Pramukh Swami Maharaj, once said, "The future is bright." With all my heart, I believe that the future is in the hands of our precious students.

More volunteers and committee members are needed as we plan exciting things ahead. Next school year, we will be celebrating the 60th anniversary of the Frances and Herbert

"Learning, Growing, Connecting, and Caring B'yachad (Together) – Our Jewish Journey Starts Here!" is our new Religious School slogan.

Our goal for the coming school year is to focus not only on learning, but also on connecting.

We have learned from the last Temple survey that our families are looking to connect and build personal ties with each other. Therefore, we are planning to create more family education programs for each grade that will allow families to introduce themselves and learn together. Social events connected to our Jewish holidays like Hanukkah, Purim, or Sukkot will be another way to bring our families together.

We have already seen some good results from our amazing program – Torah Explorers B'Yachad – a program for our young families with children. A new Havurah is being created by families who met at this program and now are ready to take it a step forward and create more social opportunities for themselves.

We want to establish more social opportunities for our teens as well. Our goal is to attract more teens to join our High School and continue their studies while also forming long-lasting relationships. We are planning to hire a part-time Youth Director who will help organize informal activities for our teens.

Last summer, I participated in a three-day workshop related to Israel curriculum, sponsored by Federation, and I am happy to share that I am writing a new curriculum that will engage the learning about Israel through various Judaic topics, that are part of our school curricula. I am thankful to the Federation for allowing me to be part of this special project.

As always, we welcome your ideas and comments and are looking forward to building, connecting, and learning together with you.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



We have spent a lot of time over the past few years exploring what it is to create and support community, but sometimes, we have to step back and ask, why are we doing this?

We have been asking these questions lately of leadership, of you in our surveys, and in small discussion groups. One of the answers that came through loud and clear: We all want to ensure an enduring presence in this community. We want to make sure that there is a Jewish community here for our children and grandchildren. And we want to make sure there is a Jewish future for our families and community.

How do we make sure this community endures? By investing in our future, with our vision, our hearts, our money, and our time.

And that is just what we have done.

When I became your executive director, I knew this was a community with a proud history and a lot of heart. So many people have poured their love and attention into TBO. At the same time, there were weak spots. For a community our size, we had almost no endowment. We did not know how much money we needed to maintain the building in the coming years. And our mortgage would need to be reset in a few years and the interest rates would be higher.

So, we put our thinking caps on. We envisioned what it would take to sustain ourselves and be even better. We imagined what our possibilities were, where we wanted to go, who we wanted to be.

We now have an endowment of over \$1M that will help fund not only RS scholarships, but family programming. We have invested in our board and board operations to generate excellent planning and oversight. We set up a regular program of building investment and improvement, to not only maintain our building, but make it work better for us. We have retired our mortgage with your investment and used the savings to hire a membership engagement and development manager to invest in you, our members, and we plan to hire a youth director to further invest in our next generation.

None of this would have been possible without you. Your time. Your heart. Your vision and your money. Whether you contribute \$360 or \$360K, ten or hundreds of hours, you are a part of making our future possible. Thank you.

VP OF ENGAGEMENT



We on the TBO Board recognize that in order to remain a vibrant and thriving congregation, it's imperative that we continue to bring in new members and ensure that current members feel engaged in meaningful ways.

Our current membership is 409 families, slightly up from last year, including 719 adults, and 417 "children" under the age of 26. These numbers don't include the extended community of families who are not members but participate in our toddler programs, preschool, and religious school.

Our engagement efforts this past year have been very focused and intentional. Last summer we did a comprehensive congregational survey to determine exactly how you, our members, are feeling about your TBO experience. In all, 209 members responded. We are using the information collected as we plan the coming year and have launched some significant initiatives as a result.

A direct benefit of paying off our mortgage is that we were able to hire our new Membership Engagement and Development Manager, Samantha Berman. One of her first priorities has been to revitalize our Renaissance group. Sam is also working to engage our millennials and Gen Z members in their 20s and 30s.

In April, we held our first-ever TBO Expo! Current and prospective members showed up to learn about all the ways to get involved at TBO. We're expecting a number of the prospective members to join, and even more importantly, our current members are excited about the programs they weren't already aware of.

At the Expo we announced a new initiative called TBO Tribes where small groups of people will get together on a regular basis around a common interest, whether it be a hobby, a cause, or a stage of life. This gives temple members an opportunity to forge relationships as they spend time together. They will have a foundation of friendships that help them feel more connected. Stay tuned for more information and a chance to sign up.

Meanwhile our marketing team is working to improve how we communicate all the amazing things happening at TBO. We're currently updating the website home page with improved calendar functionality. Once this is in place, we will be able to streamline

Many of you have gotten much more involved. This resulted in part from our TBO Expo, where you were able to learn the many ways members can become active, find passion points, and contribute back.


The Engagement Committee's goal is to help you engage and equip you with the tools to impact our Kehillah's future, because it's in your hands.

Our Emerging Culture of Giving & Philanthropy

The success of the Imagine the Possibilities campaign is due to the extraordinary generosity of 93 families. In addition to retiring our \$1.7M mortgage, one outcome is an emerging culture of giving and philanthropy. This culture begins and ends with our members' desires to make an individual and personal impact.

During the two-year campaign, our committee sat down with potential donors, asked them how and why Jewish life matters to them, and listened intently to their responses. This process allowed donors to express their Jewish values and to align their gift with those values. As a result, Rabbi Satz and our committee established deeper connections with these donors.

The purpose of the Giving & Philanthropy Committee is to provide opportunities, based on knowledge about you, to express your charitable aspirations and desire to strengthen our Kehillah. Every member of our community can be a philanthropist because it is about your values, not the size of your gift.

The act of providing financial resources to support our communities is deeply rooted in our Jewish heritage. Our hope is that by getting to know our members on a deeper personal level and understanding your desires and wishes, we are providing another opportunity for you to express your Jewish experience and journey.


*Phone Check-Ins – A friendly voice can make all the difference. If you or a loved one would benefit from regular calls, our volunteers are available for comforting check-ins.

CO-CHAIRS, SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE






We have Co-Chaired the TBO Social Action Committee for about 10 years and during our chairmanship, we have created opportunities for the TBO community to give back to the broader Morristown community and nationally. We are proud of the things that we have done, ranging from providing coats during Sukkot, to marching for safer gun laws, to hosting multiple food drives, to cleaning up local waterways.

The High Holy Day Food Drive to benefit the Interfaith Food Pantry has been an annual event at TBO for more than 40 years. The TBO Social Action Committee has organized the drive since 2017, but the format has changed during our time. When we first started, we solicited the donations of paper bags from Kings, organized teams to staple the requested food list to the bags, recruited volunteers to place the bags in the pews before each Rosh Hashana service, and recruited more volunteers to staff the collection sites in the parking lot during the Yom Kippur services. During COVID, we organized a "drive-thru" food drive where volunteers collected bags of food from the trunk of cars, avoiding all contact with the donors.

Since COVID, our process is a little bit different, and we think it has become better. We no longer provide paper bags and therefore bags are not distributed throughout the pews. Instead, we prepare and distribute flyers about the food drive that are handed out with the prayer books by the High Holy Day ushers. The food is donated generously by our TBO community using their own reusable bags, and the TBO Social Action Committee volunteers collect the bags of food from the cars as they arrive on Yom Kippur.



The World Zionist Congress (WZC) is the global parliament of the Jewish people, a platform for Jews from around the world to engage in Israel's actions and values. Temple B'nai Or recognized the importance of this democratic institution and led a campaign to rally the congregation for the vote.

Key to TBO's success was fostering understanding of the WZC's role. A learning session with Rabbi Josh Weinberg, a WZC leader, explored Israel's history and politics, and included deep discussions on Zionism. His insights left attendees motivated and informed them to take action.

TBO deepened personal connections by sharing congregants' stories of their ties to Israel including a rich multicultural family. These narratives emphasized voting as a way to honor Jewish heritage and secure its future.

Congregants turned out enthusiastically, driven by love for Israel, progressive Reform Zionist values, and Jewish unity. The WZC Election Results Are In – Historic Victory for Reform Movement! Vote Reform won a commanding victory!

Our slate received more votes than any of the 22 slates by a wide margin. We obtained the largest number of votes in the history of the WZC, and we did so by running a fair, honorable campaign and upholding our Reform Jewish values. Thank you to everyone who participated.

Temple B'nai Or embarked on its first year of participation in the Anti-Defamation League's (ADL) Kulanu program, an initiative to help congregations across the country arm themselves in the fight against antisemitism. Members of the committee participated in ADL webinars and community events, gaining valuable insights and resources to address antisemitism and foster understanding. We proudly hosted our 2nd annual college panel discussing antisemitism on campus, featuring five TBO college students and Rutgers Hillel Rabbi. The candid conversations shed light on challenges faced by Jewish students and reinforced the importance of seeking community and education.

TBO members also attended ADL's "Never Is Now" conference, further enriching their understanding of combating hate and discrimination. Looking ahead to next year, plans are underway to host engaging events, such as a movie screening and speaker engagements, and participate in Diversity Day in Morristown to share Jewish culture and raise awareness in the broader community.
